BOBLO BOATS a Detroit ferry tale -

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LOGLINE

For over 85 years, steamship *Ste. Claire* transported generations of Detroiters to Boblo Island, an amusement park nestled in the waters between the US and Canada. When the vessel comes under threat of ruin, a doctor, psychic and amusement park fanatic unite to save their beloved steamship from the scrapyard. Interweaving local lore and mythology, "Boblo Boats" explores the whitewashed history of amusement parks and one crew's crusade to bring back the memories.

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

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Synopsis


Boblo Island, one of America's earliest amusement parks, sparked the imaginations of Detroiters for more than 85 years. Passengers by the thousands reached the island by way of two sister steamships, *SS Columbia* and *Ste Claire*, designed by naval architect Frank Kirby. Their 90 years of operation witnessed America's industrial revolution and social justice movements. In 1993 Boblo Island tragically shut down, and the boats were left to ruin. Mirroring Detroit's decline and resurgence, two teams of people doggedly attempt the restoration of these iconic vessels as the city stands in the midst of a grass roots renaissance.

SS Columbia is presently owned by a New York-based nonprofit endowed with grants and employing experienced nautical preservationists. They are resurrecting Columbia into a traveling museum and event space in Buffalo, leaving Ste. Claire as Detroit's last vestige of Boblo Island. Claire's fate rests in the hands of an unlikely band of heroes: a doctor, a psychic, and an amusement park fanatic.

The documentary walks an aesthetic and narrative tightrope, accommodating rosy memories of Boblo Island without neglecting the whitewashed history of segregation in America's early amusement parks. The film pays homage to the forgotten civil rights hero Sarah E. Ray who forced the integration of Boblo Island in 1945. Although her story has previously been omitted from Detroit history, it was part of the NAACP's road to the seminal *Brown v. Board of Education* decision, which ended the separate but equal doctrine in 1954. Due to the filmmakers' efforts, her former home was recently chosen by the National Trust for Historic Preservation as one of the '11 Most Endangered' Historic sites in America. The film also unearths the buried tale of Sugar Island, a former amusement park directly neighboring Boblo Island. It was purchased in 1945 by African Americans to be a "park for their own race" in retaliation against Boblo's segregationist policies.

KEVIN MAYER



GLORIA DAVIS

Dr. Ron Kattoo, majority owner of *Ste Claire*, is a family man with an 80-hour-week practice as a pulmonologist. Despite having no background in ship restoration, Kattoo has persevered through stage 4 bladder cancer, a brain tumor and severe financial setbacks to keep *Ste Claire* afloat.

Kevin Mayer, a devoted former Boblo Island employee, is Kattoo's right hand man. Mayer loves the boats for what they represent: a carefree childhood and an escape from reality. He has been haunted by the closing of Boblo Island for over twenty years. Mayer's difficulty in moving on from the past has taken a toll on his home life and emotional well being.

Gloria Davis is an elderly woman with an astute gift for tarot card reading who claims to have a psychic connection with *SS Columbia*. Her fear and reluctance of communicating with *Ste Claire* lies in the vessel's more turbulent and troubled legend. She offers the audience a more ethereal perspective on the past, present and future of the sister ships.

ARTISTIC APPROACH

Opening with a sweeping aerial shot of a dilapidated "Boblo Island" sign on the Detroit River near sunrise, the film casts a languid spell on the audience. *SS Columbia* herself, voiced by Motown legend Martha Reeves, begins her tale with the hushed, wizened authority of a sage:

"This river is my home. I can tell you the names of every current and eddy... My name is Columbia. And I have a sister, Claire."

The film makes a bold statement right in its opening minutes: this is not your usual historical documentary. Not only will our tale expand your horizons with history and sociological insight, it will also stir your emotions through a yarn of quixotic resilience, passion and daring. The character of *Columbia* is based on anecdotes from historians and residents. *Colum-*

bia has grown wise yet weather-beaten over the years, having witnessed generations of families come and go. But she is not without a sense of humor and glowing pride. For example, *Columbia* tells the story of Boblo Island closing down and the Detroit recession as a parallel to the classic tale of Sleeping Beauty:

"When Boblo closed down, Claire and I fell into a deep slumber. It seemed like even the Motor City itself was fast asleep. Shops closed their doors. The fires of the factory furnaces grew cold. The rivers slowed, even down to the fish, their fins frozen in time. And there we were, the oldest steamboats in America slumbering away, waiting for someone to come and wake us up."

We also utilize several animation sequences to enrich the film with a magical feeling that compliments the voiceover and helps draw the viewer into the spell of Boblo Island. Sarah Elizabeth Ray's fight to integrate Boblo Island is depicted using stop motion animation with handcrafted puppets instead of the more conventional presentation of archival footage. This novel, stylistic choice lifts Ray's story from the dusty pages of history books and transforms it into a mythic yet contemporary allegory.

A aron Schillinger's directorial debut is *Boblo Boats: A Detroit Ferry Tale* (2021). The documentary was selected for FilmShop's Breakthrough Competition at Film Society of Lincoln Center and won the 'Hometown Talent' award at Freep Film Fest. Aaron is a cofounder of the Sarah E. Ray Project, an organization shining a light on the forgotten Detroit civil rights pioneer. His production company, Baby Volcano Films, specializes in non-profit clients. Baby Volcano's LGBTQ+ themed short film *Pepper* (2018) received premieres at the Seattle International Film Festival, Jeonju International Film Festival and Cleveland International Film Festival.

'Dancing in the Street' has been entered into the Library of Congress Registry of Historical Recordings and into the Grammy Hall of Fame. Martha Reeves and the Vandellas, are listed among Rolling Stone magazine's '100 Immortal Artists.' All of the roadways to victory in Martha's career have lead her to the ultimate lights of Hollywood, where she will receive her STAR on the 'Hollywood Walk of Fame 2022' on Hollywood Blvd.
